Instructions for authors

The journal is set to publish articles in the fields of philosophy and sociology. Philosophy articles include the following areas of research: phenomenology, hermeneutics, the history of philosophy and aesthetics. In sociology, the journal welcomes submissions on various topics, including theoretical and empirical research based on quantitative and qualitative methods. Two annual issues are dedicated to philosophy (the first and third issues) and two to sociology (the second and fourth issues). The journal also provides extensive reviews of original or translated books that have recently been published in Lithuania and abroad. All articles and reviews must be original.

The Editors reserve the right to determine whether submitted manuscripts fall within the scope of the journal and to not accept manuscripts for peer review that clearly do not meet its scientific standards and publication profile.

We expect that the text submitted for publication is not being considered for publication elsewhere.

Manuscripts are to be in either Lithuanian or English.

We ask that submissions include a **separate file** with the author(s) details and **an an-onymised manuscript** for peer review.

The file with author details should include the following in this order:

- the title:
- authors' names:
- authors' institutional affiliation and country (no departments or faculties);
- contact details for the corresponding author, including postal and email addresses;
- ORCID number;
- an abstract of 150–250 words;
- keywords (4–6);
- the text;
- acknowledgements (if applicable);
- funding information (if applicable);
- the list of references;
- if the manuscript is submitted in English, a summary is to be provided in Lithuanian, and vice versa.

Anonymised manuscript for review is used for the peer review. **To anonymise your paper**, please remove all details that may disclose your identity, by doing the following:

- remove author name(s) and institution(s);
- remove acknowledgements and funding information;
- anonymise ethical approvals and avoid mentioning institutions;
- avoid using self-citations. If you include it, please change and refer in the third person. For example: Vovere (2025) has shown and not 'we have previously shown' (Vovere, 2025). The full list of references is to be included in the anonymised manuscript.

References are to be presented in the Harvard style of referencing (see https://citationsy.com/styles/sage-harvard).

Manuscripts are to be in MS Word and should use the Times New Roman 12 point typeface.

The length of the manuscript is to be in a range of 4,200 to 5,000 words for *Philosophy* and 7,000 words for *Sociology* issues.

All manuscripts have to be submitted online through the Open Journal System (OJS): https://www.lmaleidykla.lt/ojs/index.php/filosofija-sociologija/user/register (non-registred users) or https://www.lmaleidykla.lt/ojs/index.php/filosofija-sociologija/login (registred users).

The journal uses the double-blind peer review.

Manuscripts resubmitted after the review should highlight changes made. Please use the track change function in MS Word.

The resubmission should be accompanied by the point-to-point response to the reviewers. Please prepare responses for each review.

The Policy on the Use of AI

The Journal recognises the potential of the artificial intelligence (AI) to serve authors at various stages of the research process.

The use of AI tools to improve language and grammar does not require disclosure. This is known as assistive AI.

However, the use of AI tools to produce content must be disclosed.

Authors are fully responsible for the content of their manuscript, including parts produced by an AI tool, and are thus liable for any breach of publication ethics.'
